TRANSFORMING CHURCH AND SOCIETY – THE SIXTEENTH CENTURY REFORMATIONS

Virtually everything about the sixteenth century Reformations is controversial. Did they usher in modernity, or represent a lurch backwards, or is continuity the main motif?

Were they popular, or an elitist movement soon to be captured by princely courts? Was Luther death-obsessed, Calvin a theocrat, the Radicals plain nuts? What role did theology, politics, social and cultural agendas play? What are the key sources to understand the Reformations: the literature of aspiration of the reformers themselves (their pamphlets, commentaries, catechisms) or the music, the art, the humbler detritus of ordinary people? And finally: can we get beyond our own constructions of the past to the actual history itself?
