FOUNDED ON GOLD: Dunedin's legacy of 19th century industrial enterprise

On the back of the wealth created by the Otago gold rush of the 1860s, local entrepreneurs founded a wide range of businesses which were to become significant on the national scene, so that for a while Dunedin reigned as the commercial capital of New Zealand.

This course traces the histories of a number enterprises formed in the latter half of the 19th century, many of which are still going strong today.

ANN BARSBY was instrumental in the setting up of the Southern Heritage Trust in 2002 and continues to be the inspiration and driving force behind many of its activities. She is also active as a committee member of several other local heritage organisations and is heavily involved in the Gasworks Museum Trust. She was formerly head of the Tourism Department of Otago Polytechnic.
