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## Aspects of te ao Māori

(Aspects of the Māori World)

Prior to the arrival of Europeans to Aotearoa New Zealand, the indigenous people where known by their affiliation to their *hapū* (sub-tribe), *iwi* (tribe) and *waka* (canoe), only after interactions with the new arrivals did the indigenous people identify themselves as Māori. Through this course you will be introduced to *te ao* Māori, the Māori world, and from a Māori perspective you will gain some understanding of their society, history, challenges and changes that contribute to who Māori are today.
