This course will examine the significance of the story of Troy for the Greeks, for whom it was an enduring platform for the exploration of ideas about gods, war, justice and the rather uncomfortable place of human beings in the scheme of things. Homer's 8th century BC poem the *Iliad* brings a particular focus on a world in which war and glory are necessarily touched with tragedy. Three centuries later Euripides in his plays *Hecuba* and *Women of Troy* goes a few steps further and evaporates the glory in something like an apocalypse.
