Terence Dennis, Pianist, Blair Professor of Music at the University of Otago and current National President of the New Zealand Wagner Society, discusses Wagner's historic significance and modern relevance. He has been long acclaimed both internationally and nationally for his performances and teaching; of particular note has been his extensive recital partnership with Dame Kiri Te Kanawa, with whom he presented around 50 performances across the world, including two Royal performances. His recent CD with international tenor Simon O'Neil, *Distant Beloved,* was released worldwide on the Decca label, and was awarded the 2019 NZ Music Award "Classical".

Why Wagner?

23 May	Towards a new aesthetic How Wagner conceived his "music drama", his radical new concept of opera, from the period of German Romanticism.
30 May	Principles at play How "Das Rheingold" and "Die Walküre" exemplify Wagner's concept of "music drama" as formulated in his influential writings on developing a unified work of art for the operatic stage.
6 June	Wagner and antisemitism This session explores the music of the celebrated composer Meyerbeer, the most successful of the 19 th century opera composers, and how Wagner's notorious antisemitism was fired by Meyerbeer's spectacular career as the greatest composer of the French <i>Grand Opéra</i> .
13 June	Wagner in historic performance We listen to celebrated singers of Wagner from his own era through the 20 th century. A touchstone of style and operatic history.
20 June	Wagner and beyond How his work influenced so many future composers with examples from Richard Strauss, Korngold and Chausson.
