### The Programme

This course will concentrate on the archaeology of Bodmin Moor and the Scilly Isles where sites contain remains from at least the early Neolithic to the Industrial Revolution. The last talk will review the material in terms of 'cultural heritage' and as a component of Cornish 'nationalism'.

Peter Gathercole, Emeritus Fellow Darwin College, Cambridge is on a short visit to Dunedin. He built up the Anthropology Department at Otago University in the 1960s before returning to appointments at Oxford and Cambridge and now lives in Cornwall. He is a former President of the Cornwall Archaeological Society and currently joint editor of the journal "Cornish Archaeology". Peter is particularly interested in the cultural history and social problems of the Scilly Isles, not least, its stands of *Cordyline australis*.
