The Thursday Current Affairs Group...

...had their September meeting this week and all were present.

Several topics were discussed vigorously (the culling of 600,000 books from the National Library... The Greatness or lack of Greatness of the USA; the controversy around capping of the number of students wishing to enter 2nd Year medicine), but overwhelmingly, members were concerned about two important issues:

One:- The recent sinking of a vessel, the Gulf Livestock 1, carrying a large cargo of live cows from New Zealand to China.

It was reported many of the animals were pregnant and the fear and suffering aboard that ship when she was hit by a typhoon that subsequently sank her off the coast of Japan, are horrendous. After discussing the issue we decided we needed to do something rather than just sit and talk.

The outcome was, that without involving the U3A, we would write a joint letter to the

Prime Minister and the Leader of the Opposition, asking to have all live exports from New Zealand banned. This is in the pipeline now.

This is not the first time a tragedy has happened at sea whereby live animals have endured unnecessary suffering.




New Zealand has a reputation for being green and clean, somewhere people want to come after the events of the last six months which have caused such devastation all around the world. Why are we still doing this?

The practice of loading live animals aboard ships of questionable suitability and sending them abroad to countries where we have little knowledge about their future welfare, is not in keeping with the idea that all animals should be treated kindly and humanely. We felt the need to petition our government leaders to stop this practice.

The second topic was of a scientific nature outlining how activity on the sun affects temperatures here on earth.


The article was written by Valentina Zharkova, Professor of Mathematics and Physics at Northumbria University. In layman's terms, the sun has now entered what is known as 'A Grand Solar Minimum' which it is estimated will last from 2020 - 2053.



There have been such cycles in the past with dramatic consequences for the earth as in 1645 (-1710) when a seemingly small decrease of the average temperature in the Northern Hemisphere led to frozen rivers, cold long winters and cold summers. The current 'Grand Solar Minimum' which our sun has just entered will also lead to a noticeable reduction of temperatures on earth by up to 1.0oC and this could have important consequences

for different parts of our planet with regard to vegetation, agriculture, food supplies and heating needs in both Southern and Northern hemispheres.

Governments around the world will be required to tackle problems with heat and food supplies likely to affect every person on the planet.



This global cooling down during the upcoming Grand Solar Minimum could offset for 3 decades any signs of global warming.

The writer of this piece has drawn on group discussion of the article which appeared recently in our paper, and good old Mr Google who led the way to the scientific paper presented by Professor Valentina Zharkova. Some of you may wish to read it to discover more precise information than is able to be provided here

Film Group Two...

Met for the first time on the 2nd Wednesday of September, to view the Hiro Kore'eda film *Our Little Sister*.

Sister is partly a homage film, homage both to a past director, and to the location of some of his greatest films.

The past director is Yasujiro Ozu; who died nearly 60 years ago. Unlike Akira Kurosawa who made *Seven Samurai*, Ozu was not well known in the West until the 1970's, when

we began to understand that he had been a master — one of his films, *Tokyo Story*, has been recently voted by film directors as the greatest film ever made!

Ozu's film are very 'quiet' — as a member of the initial U3A Film group puts it, "Nothing happens — but everything happens." His recurring theme is the family, its tensions and its eventual breakup — as he said himself, "I make tofu, I don't make pork cutlets — I make tofu"!

The location of *Little Sister* deserves a word — outside Tokyo Bay is a small bay where there is an ancient capital, Kamakura. *Our Little Sister* involves an unconventional family of three sisters living there in an old house, near an old train line along the coast; who discover at his death that their divorced father had had a daughter by a second wife — they visit a mountain area for his funeral (a very Ozu touch), and meet her.



It's a rather special film: as with Ozu, nothing happens, but that's a lot!



The director, Hiro Kore'eda, has recently won the Golden Palm at Cannes Film Festival for his Shoplifters; and has just made a film, The Truth, with Catherine Deneuve and Juliette Binoche!
